### DON WILDES ESTATE LEAVES \$23K TO FOUNDATION

As we live our lives, many of us may think about how we can leave this world a better place. The legacy that we work to build through our careers, the actions we take, or even the words we say can impact future generations.

Throughout his 96 years, Don Wildes was a hard working, community oriented man who gave great thought to how he could impact the world around him. Don developed his legacy as he gave his time and support to the organizations that were important to him.

After the Mauston native passed in 2016, the expanse of his financial legacy was revealed as Don left generous donations to a number of local organizations, including Mile Bluff Medical Center Foundation.

This fall, Don's brother and estate executor, Carl, presented the foundation with a donation of \$23,201.17 from Don's estate.

Growing up in a farming family with nine other siblings, Don learned the value of hard work early on in life. After graduating high school, Don went on to work construction in Rockford, Illinois before serving as a combat engineer in World War II. In 1957, Don bought a lumber yard in Mauston and worked there until his retirement in the late 1980s.

Don's youngest brother, Carl, remembers Don as a hardworking and caring person. Whether it was

helping build something, or giving time and funds, Don's desire to help others and give back to his community was a value that he held throughout his life.

"I'm not sure why he chose the hospital foundation," expressed Carl. "He didn't have any children, and maybe with all of his medical experiences, he decided to leave something to the hospital. Maybe helping to build the old hospital had an influence on him."

The members of Mile Bluff Medical Center Foundation are honored to be recipients of Don's legacy. Martha Airth-Kindree, foundation Executive Director, believes this generous gift will go to help many lives in Juneau County and the surrounding communities.

"As with many of the donations made to the foundation, Don's very generous gift will be used for the areas of greatest need," Martha explained. "These unrestricted funds allow us the flexibility to respond to the needs that arise within the medical center. We are very grateful that Don chose the foundation as part of his legacy."

## LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS SUPPORT HEALTH OF THE COMMUNITY

In 2017, several area organizations donated funds to support the health of the community through the work of the medical center and Mile Bluff Medical Center Foundation.

### **Mauston Lioness support nurses (right)**

The Mauston Lioness donated \$500 to support nurse education through Nurses Helping Nurses, a division of Mile Bluff Medical Center Foundation.

With advancements in healthcare, nurses are being encouraged to think beyond the roles of traditional nursing to pursue advanced degrees. Nurses Helping Nurses provides current and new employees financial support while pursuing higher education in nursing. Whether they are pursuing a bachelors degree, masters degree, or doctoral degree, the program supports Mile Bluff nurses in accomplishing their goals.

### **Kiwanis purchase activity center for Mile Bluff Clinic**

The Kiwanis of Mauston donated \$289 to purchase a children's activity center for children who receive care at Mile Bluff Clinic. This activity center will provide entertainment to children as they wait for their appointments.

This donation helped increase the number of activity centers the foundation purchased for all Mile Bluff clinics and for several departments in the medical center.



### **Alliant Energy supports local EMS**

The Alliant Energy Foundation awarded Mile Bluff Medical Center a \$1,000 grant to help purchase three 3G Modems to be placed in the Mauston Area Ambulances. The foundation supplied the additional funding needed for this project. Through these modems, a patient's cardiac rhythm can be sent to Mile Bluff's emergency room physicians and staff in real time allowing them to prepare a care plan prior to the patient's arrival.

Seconds count during a cardiac arrest. The faster the ER team gets an EKG, the faster treatment starts and the better a patient's chances are. These modems will impact lives and serve the community for years to come.

## COMMUNITY CARES TRANSPORTATION VAN

Thanks to generous donations from several business leaders in the community, Mile Bluff has expanded its transportation coverage!

Due to the lack of public transportation and limited taxi hours and services, getting around in Juneau County can be an issue for some. When it comes to healthcare, getting to and from appointments or returning home from the hospital, can be difficult when a patient doesn't have reliable transportation options. If patients are receiving dialysis treatment, it is crucial that they get to every treatment or risk having life threatening consequences. Lack of transportation for our community members in need can lead to serious health problems and risks.

Mark Rudig, of Rudig Jensen in New Lisbon, became aware of the medical transportation issue through his association with the foundation. Mark set out to find a solution that would help people have access to the healthcare services they need. Having been in the auto business for 38 years, and being civic-minded, it was natural for him to jump in to lead an effort to help solve the problem.

Often times, insurance requires individuals to meet certain qualifications in order to receive transportation services. Because of those rules and parameters, many patients needing medical transportation do not qualify for the vans that the hospital has. Those vans are funded by a Department Of Transportation grant and expenses are reimbursed through Medicaid or private pay, for individuals who meet certain requirements.

For some patients who do not meet the requirements for the DOT vans, limited financial resources can make it difficult to pay for other transportation options like a taxi. Other times, there are no family members who can provide a ride to appointments or home from a hospital stay.

In working together, Mark Rudig and the



foundation came up with a solution - the Community Cares Transportation van. This van is available to help people who do not qualify or cannot afford other transportation options. Mark, with support from his business partner, Bobbi Southworth, led the fundraising campaign to purchase a new van to establish the Community Cares Transportation program.

After a year of fundraising and partnering with area businesses, Mark and the foundation met their goal. Thanks to generous donations, the Community Cares Transportation Van was purchased and is now available to qualified Mile Bluff patients.

"We're lucky to be in a community with so many supportive people, and we love being some of those people as well!" Mark commented.

Martha Airth-Kindree echoed Marks sentiments, adding, "So many people have benefitted from this service. A special thanks to Mark for the vision and the drive to see it through."

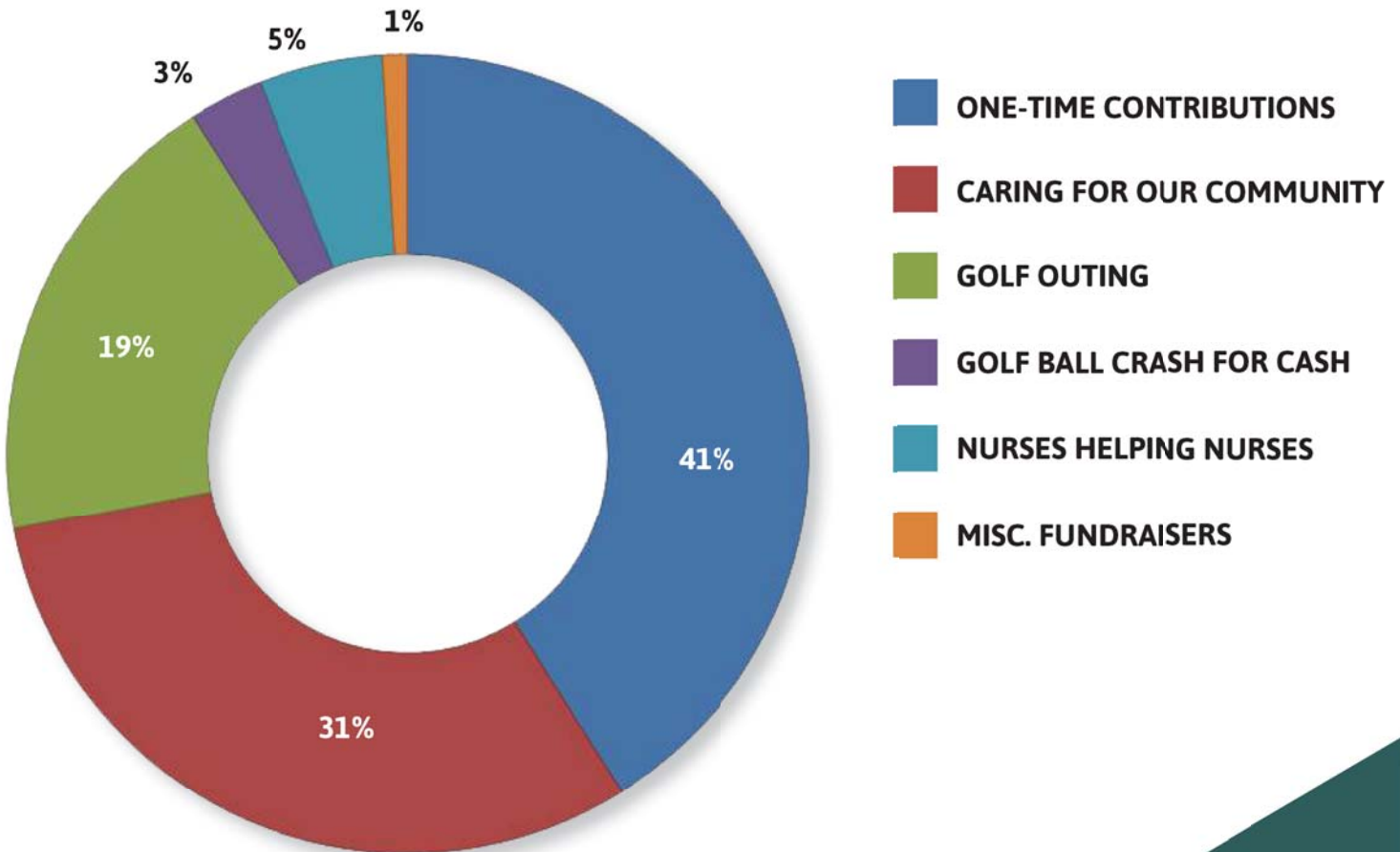

## 2017 EQUIPMENT PURCHASES

**4-D intercavity ultrasound probes \$8,192**

In the Medical Imaging Department, the probes assist technologists in providing more specific details during an ultrasound. The additional details help healthcare providers and radiologists better diagnose and treat patients.

**3 Smoke evacuator generators \$8,115**

These generators are used when cauterization is performed during surgery. The equipment combines suction with the cauterizing tool, to remove the smoke that is produced when a surgeon cauterizes an incision.

**Bladder scanner \$6,495**

This scanner is used to decrease the instances of bladder infections for residents at Fair View Nursing & Rehabilitation Center.



**Curvilinear probe \$6,630**

This probe is used by the Anesthesia Services Department during orthopedic procedures. The new probe allows the staff to provide more targeted pain management.

**3 Bariatric treatment chairs \$6,315**

The chairs replaced smaller chairs in the Infusion & Cancer Care Department that were starting to wear out.

**Patient communication boards \$4,775**

Used in the inpatient setting, the 26 boards improve communication between patients and staff members.

**MRI pulse ox machine \$3,075**

This is used in the Medical Imaging Department to track blood pressure, pulse and oxygen levels during an MRI procedure.

**IOPI system \$1,200**

This system is used in the Speech & Language Pathology Department to measure the strength of a person's tongue. It is used by patients who are demonstrating weakness resulting in swallowing or speech difficulties.



**Baby Cradle & Bedding Sets \$612**

This cradle and coordinating bedding sets are used by the Obstetrics Department during times of infant loss. In unfortunate circumstances, this set will be used in conjunction with a cooling pump system, and extend the time the body of a stillborn baby can stay with grieving parents. This will allow patients the "gift of time" during their loss.

**CD Players \$258**

The Medical Imaging Department is using these CD players to promote comfort and relaxation during medical imaging tests.

**APPROVED PURCHASES FOR 2018**

**Ferromagnetic Detection System \$21,205**

This system will be used in the Medical Imaging Department to screen patients for metal prior to receiving an MRI.

**Children's Activity Wall/Centers \$9,000**

To improve the experience of Mile Bluff's youngest patients, interactive activity wall/centers will be installed in all Mile Bluff outreach facilities, medical imaging and surgery departments.

**Low Access Power Exam Table \$6,799**

This table can be lowered close to the ground, making it easier and safer for our elderly and disabled patients (pictured bottom left).

**Mini Telemetry System \$5,899**

This wireless system allows mothers in labor to walk freely in their rooms or hallways while being monitored for contractions and fetal heart tones.

**Sci-Fit PRO 2 Total Body Exerciser \$4,916**

This machine will be used to improve heart and lung health in patients undergoing cardiac or pulmonary rehabilitation.

**Premier Broselow Pediatric Cart \$3,680**

This cart is designed to aid in rapid response to pediatric patients needing intubation in an emergency situation.

**Surgery IV Warmer \$3,045**

Warming IV fluids before they are given to a patient undergoing surgery improves patient outcomes.

**Electronic Scale \$2,798**

This scale will be used at Necedah Family Medical Center to provide extra support rails for anyone with trouble standing without assistance.

**Bubble CPAP System \$2,700**

Respiratory Therapy will use this to provide continuous positive airway pressure when a newborn baby has labored breathing or low oxygen levels.

**GKmini Walking Surface \$2,700**

This moving surface helps rehabilitation patients relearn to walk after a stroke or spinal cord injury.

**Two iPads \$900**

iPads will be used by our speech pathologists to provide education, direct visual/audio feedback, and provide therapeutic exercises/tasks.

**Sensory Equipment for Dementia Care \$800**

This equipment helps decrease agitation, reduce restlessness, and even improve sleep in residents with dementia. Pictured bottom right, a Fair View resident enjoys using an electronic therapy cat.
